CABE 2005 provides attendees the opportunity to share perspectives and seek solutions for common challenges in an atmosphere of collegiality and professional respect. Programs for English Learners are successful when educators engage and support all students in learning and create and maintain effective, culturally responsive learning environments. At CABE 2005 participants can attend a wide variety of institutes and workshops that offer new, innovative ways of:

- Planning instruction for second language learners;
- Designing learning experiences for culturally, linguistically and racially, diverse background students:
- Adapting subject matter lessons that raise the level of academic English and increase subject matter knowledge;
- Assessing student learning;

- Administering culturally and linguistically appropriate programs for academic success;
- Learning about new and effective instructional materials;
- Integrating technology in programs for English Learners;
- Highlighting successful practices with proven results; and
- Engaging parents and community in the instructional program.

#### MEET NCLB PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS

CABE 2005 allows teachers to meet the NCLB requirement that all teachers of English Learners, assigned to teach core academic subjects, will be highly qualified and demonstrate core academic subject matter competence. Teachers who attend the full four-day conference of standards aligned professional development can accrue up to 20 hours (earning 5 points) towards completing the California High Objective Uniform State Standard of Evaluation (HOUSSE). Individual districts can provide information about the specific clock-hour requirements for their district. CABE will award teachers a transcript of completion that may be used as a part of a professional development sequence approved by local school districts. Printed receipts of attendance, signed by the presenter, will be available in the meeting rooms at the end of each session.

The following full (6 hour) and half-day (3 hour) institutes in Reading and Language Arts, Mathematics and Science, Social Science, and Visual and Performing Arts are a sampling of the quality professional development opportunities available (for full descriptions see www.bilingualeducation.org). # CABE 2005 also brings attendees professional development institutes and workshops highlighting the following strand areas:

- Assessment, Evaluation & Accountability Strand Features workshops and institutes for evaluating services and results for accountability and instructional improvement for English Learners.
- Parent and Community Engagement Strand Several workshops and institutes will focus on parent involvement and leadership development to increase the voices of parents as they become active partners in education and advocates for their children. Many workshops and institutes are also available for parents attending the conference to increase their skills as parents and to engage more fully in their children's education.
- ParaEducators Strand ParaEducators play a key role in the education of English Learners and provide valuable services to teachers and to the parents of English Learners. Workshops and institutes will feature strategies for working with students and for building bridges to the wider school community.
- Serving the Needs of Standard English Learners Strand Presents several workshops and institutes on Standard English Learners (SELS). These are students for whom Standard English is not native, and whose home languages differ in structure and form from the language of school or what is referred to as standard American or academic English. They include African American, Hawaiian American, Mexican American and Native American students traditionally identified as part of the English only population.
- Asian and Pacific American Strand Features workshops and institutes on the importance of language and culture for Asian and Pacific Americans. Assimilation and "becoming American" two generations ago for Asian and Pacific Americans entailed divesting their culture and heritage. Over the past two decades, however, they have begun questioning the need to give up their identity in order to be successful in this country.
- Indigenous Languages Strand Workshops and institutes will feature Heritage language programs that are making a difference and helping students relearn their language and cultures. Many indigenous language groups are losing valuable linguistic and cultural resources and this loss of language and culture is having detrimental effects on students' academic success and their ability to remain connected to their families.
- Multicultural, Anti-Racist Curriculum Strand The academic success of culturally, linguistically, and racially diverse background students demands that the instructional programs and teaching be responsive and respecting of students' language and culture. This strand showcases strategies and features of culturally responsive instructional practices and programs.
- Early Childhood Education Strand Providing English Learners with early school experiences is important for their educational success, however these learning environments must be culturally and linguistically responsive. The principles and quality of school readiness programs will be featured in workshops and institutes and will highlight the need to plan research-based early childhood education programs that fully integrate language and culture for the academic success of the children who participate.
- Two-Way Bilingual Immersion Strand Two-way bilingual (dual) immersion programs are featured in workshops and institutes that highlight successful programs and provide participants with the how-to's for implementing quality programs for English Learners and English proficient students.
- Technology Strand Technology is infused in many venues throughout the conference. The Cyber Café in the exhibit hall provides opportunities to network, receive emails, advocate for English Learners and learn about new programs and professional development in the area of technology. Institutes and workshops also feature hands-on technology information on new and innovative ways to teach English Learners by incorporating technology into their school program.
- Teacher Preparation/Professional Development Strand Teachers are the key components to programs for English Learners and as such must receive appropriate professional training and continued development to effectively teach English Learners. Institutes and workshops on the latest teacher preparation and professional development will provide information on many innovative, research based practices.







## 1. GENERAL PROGRAMS/ SERVICES FOR SECOND LANGUAGE LEARNERS

Language Assessment Center (K-12): Assessment Centers are locations specifically created for identification of, and placement services for, English Language Learners. The assessment information is provided to schools ensuring English Learners placement into instructional programs that meet their linguistic/instructional needs.

Two-Way Bilingual/Dual Immersion: These programs have a strong, comprehensive instructional design that includes English Language Development, primary language instruction and SDAIE (Specially Designed Academic Instruction in English/other non-English language). There are two language groups represented in the Two-Way classroom: English Learners and English proficient students who serve as language models for each other during the instructional day. The goal of this program is to promote high levels of biliteracy in two languages.
- b. Elementary Transitional Bilingual Programs (TBE): The purpose of these programs is to use the native language of English Learners as a bridge while they transfer into total English instruction. Instruction in TBE programs develops and enriches the students' native language as they learn English, so that students can access the total curriculum.

#### A Practical, Technology-Based Resource for My Teaching and Tutoring: Let's Navigate This New Website!

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
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
